



Great Reads for Grade 3

To make a little candy money, Hoey and his friend Twig decide to catch a shark and charge people to see it. Can you catch a shark with ketchup, a cricket bat and rope?




Nancy Clancy: Super Sleuth* by Jane O'Connor. INT OCONNOR.


Bug Zoo by Nick Baker. 595.7 B165.

When everyone seems down in the dumps, Junior Deputy Mayor Sunny Holiday advises the mayor on ways to make their town a better place and turn everyone's moods around.




Moonshot: The Flight of Apollo 11 by Brian Floca. 629.454 F628.





Reading Tips
